## **MATRON JESSIE MCHARDY WHITE MBE RRC MMM OSS**

Born Jessie McHardy Williamson in 1870 at Yarra Flats (near Healesville) to Scottish immigrant parents

Widowed at 26 when her husband Thomas White died in 1896

Trained as a nurse at the Alfred Hospital and the Women's Hospital (1896-1901)

Joined the fledgling Australian Army Nursing Service Reserve about 1906

Nursed at Mena House Private Hospital, 29 Simpson Street, East Melbourne

Purchased 118 Gipps Street, East Melbourne in 1914; converted it from a boarding house into a private hospital named 'Crathie' (after her mother's birthplace in Scotland)

Selected as one of the first army nurses from Victoria for 'foreign service' in 1914, aged 44

Remained the only member of her immediate family to join up

Served in Egypt in 1914 and 1915 with a British military hospital, a hospital ship and the 1st Australian General Hospital

Appointed Principal Matron of the AIF in England in 1916, in charge of the **AANS there**

**Returned to Australia in late 1916 for 'retirement at her own request'** (Service Record)

**Re-appointed for active service in 1917, in charge of 360 Australian** matrons and nurses staffing British hospitals in Salonika

Managed hospitals, nurses and patients in extreme conditions – blizzards and heat waves, air raids, food shortages, attacks on nurses by locals and severe illness among the nurses

Inspired many around her at Salonika with infectious energy and enthusiasm – celebrated when her nurses married, presented prizes at sports events, relished entertainments and tourist drives

**Returned to Australia and was discharged in August 1919** 

Highly decorated: Mentioned in Despatches, Royal Red Cross (1st Class), Member of the British Empire, Medal for Military Merit (Greece), Order of St Sava (5th Class) (Serbia)

Actively involved in Returned Sisters organisations and affairs, and continued nursing for many years

**Died Hawthorn on 26 October 1957.**
